#### FROM THE DESK OF THE PASTOR:

Revelations 3:20 – "Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with them, and they with me." One of the famous paintings of Jesus is when he is standing at the door knocking. The image has been reproduced by many different artists and differs slightly by what each artist visualized. There is one thing in common as we look at each different painting- there is no doorknob. Jesus Christ cannot open the door; he is kept out until someone on the other side opens the door. It is just like the old saying that you can lead a horse to water, but you can't make it drink. We can tie up our neighbors, family and friends, drag them to church, but we cannot make them open up their hearts to Jesus. Jesus waits patiently outside everyone's door to be let in. We can introduce them to the door which Jesus is standing behind waiting on them. Some people take a little longer than others to answer the knock at the door, so the knocking continues. The church today plays an important role in waiting patiently with Jesus on the other side of the door to be let in. Imagine the painting in your mind, Jesus is standing outside a door knocking and the entire congregation of believers are standing behind Jesus waiting. On Sunday mornings when we gather for worship it is often the same families, the same faces, the same voices that are present. On the Sunday's when a stranger comes in to worship, they have just opened the door. The congregation of people standing behind Jesus reply; "Here





we are, standing with you, so you are not alone to answer the door, inviting ~ Pastor Teff Jesus to come into your heart".

#### 2024 INCOME AND EXPENSE

For the first two months of 2024, the church has a shortfall of approximately \$9,000. However, the church has paid its full amount of the Shared Ministries to Conference. This is around the same shortfall that was experienced in 2023.

Please, if you are behind in your offering to the church; try to make up your offering in the next few months, if you are able. It is important to continue to send in your offering, even if you are not attending church service.

Thanks to everyone who has maintained their offering this year. And if you are able to give over your normal annual giving please do. Your offering will be greatly appreciated. We are blessed to have such a giving congregation.

#### **Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD)**

Individuals 70  $\frac{1}{2}$  and older may be eligible for a QCD. This special tax break allows the donor to take from their IRA for charitable purposes and avoid income tax on the distribution. See your financial planner or income tax preparer to see if this applies to you.

#### **2024 STEWARDSHIP CAMPAIGN**

For the 2024 Stewardship Campaign twenty-six pledges were received totaling \$65,364 including \$6,124 for the Capital Fund. This compares to the 2019 Stewardship Campaign forty-two pledges received totaling \$76,620 including \$3,820 for the Capital Fund.

Wage increases totalling almost \$5,000 for employees (including pastor, maintenance, music, finance, and secretary) were approved for 2024.

#### **ADMINISTRATION BOARD MEETING**

The March Ad Board meeting was held on March 21, 2024 at 7PM. Attending the meeting were Pastor Jeff, Doug Miller, Sandy Wittmeyer, Gail Proctor and Mike Campbell. Jeff opened the meeting with a prayer after noting that Dominic was doing better and that Roberta Gard from the Colden church is not doing well. In the Pastor Report Jeff noted that UMCOR buckets will be collected in coming weeks, the Upper NY Annual Conference will be held May 30-June 1st, and the four-year General Conference will be held April 23rd-May 3rd. Jeff reported that we had 50 people in church March 17th and about 30 in Colden totaling about 80 for the two churches. We need 120





people to support a full time pastor per the District.

Mike reported that the Child Center is doing well with close to 60 children attending. The Center closed one day due to the boiler failure, but the second day all but the infants were able to attend by using the parlor and big room end. There was a recent bench-marking exercise done comparing our operations to another local day care center. Our salaries are similar and the cost to attend at our center is a little lower. The Child Center is now giving out recruitment bonuses to anyone who recommends a person who is hired. They are also giving signing bonuses to new employees after ninety days of employment. This money comes from a grant that was received from New York State. We are always looking for new employees so don't hesitate to recommend someone you know.

Sandy gave Nancy Schwab's reports for the Worship Committee and the United Woman of Faith (see articles above). Sandy also gave the PPR report. Mike gave Rick Roehner's Finance report, and Doug gave the Trustee report. Mike reported that the Spring Fish Dinners will be on April 5th and 19th. Mike reported that the corned beef sandwiches after the St. Patrick's day service was a big success. Food and fellowship were enjoyed by all and we raised \$631 for the music fund. The music budget for 2024 was cut back significantly so this money helps fund music program on-going expenses such as new music, sound equipment, visiting musicians, etc. This money is needed to keep our great music program at a high level, but the Boiler Fund is still active as we have raised \$11,500 toward our goal of \$50,000. The Narthex boiler is planned to be replaced this summer so we will continue to raise money through donations and various events including a chicken barbeque in the summer.

The Board agreed that future meetings will be held at 6PM instead of 7PM. The next meeting is April 18, 2024 at 6PM in the parlor.

We are still working towards getting a lift to replace the bulbs in the front cross. We will try to coordinate it with an exterminator to spray for carpenter bees at the same time so we don't pay twice for one.

The parking lot will be scheduled for a seal coat when weather allows. We waited until spring to hopefully get a better coat that wouldn't be scraped away with plowing, and salt.

Our boiler fund is currently at \$11,500. We are hoping to raise approximately \$50,000. We don't have an exact cost yet, as prices are very unpredictable. Please pray for the best outcome in these matters.
